

Not only that, she set up a cookery school and ran a high-class tavern attracting both gentry and nobility. She reputedly gave birth to sixteen daughters, wrote a book on midwifery and was an effective exorciser of evil spirits.

Manchester's Early Role as a Hub for Campaigning for LGBTQ+ Rights



Whilst knowledge of the Stonewall Riots in America and the impact on the LGBTQ+ rights movement is common, few people are aware of the influential campaigns for LGBTQ+ rights that took place in Manchester, particularly in the 60s, 70s, and 80s.

Allan Horsfall, who was a Labour Party member in 1956, is a prominent figure in these campaigns. His entire collection of papers, where a significant amount of information from this blog comes from, is found in the

Manchester Central Library Archives. It was such an interesting experience looking through his collection of newspaper clippings, transcripts from interviews and many other letters and articles relating to the LGBTQ+ rights movement in Manchester.

Thousands of cassettes, open reels, CDs and MiniDiscs are sitting in archives, museums, libraries and in people's homes all over the UK. All kinds of unique live music, radio and conversation are recorded on these tapes and discs. We've already lost many of the people captured on them. And the British Library estimates that we have fifteen years to preserve the sounds themselves.

That's why the British Library has received funding from the National Lottery Heritage Fund to establish Unlocking Our Sound Heritage, an exciting new national project to save thousands sounds which are at risk of being lost forever.

Archives+ is the hub partner for the North West region, which covers Cheshire, Cumbria, Greater Manchester, Lancashire and Merseyside. We'll be digitising around 15,000 recordings on 5,000 cassettes, reels and optical discs held all over the region here at Manchester Central Library.



Exploring the Secret World of your Freemason Ancestor

Freemasonry, the teachings and practices of the secret fraternal order of Free and Accepted Masons, is the largest worldwide secret society. Spread by the advance of the British Empire, this secret order remains most popular in the British Isles and in other countries originally within the empire. Established in England in 1717, the Freemasons are synonymous with elitism, mystery and secrecy. However, Freemasons who believe in a *Supreme Divine Being* and the immortality of the soul, strongly deny this. They maintain that they are a society deeply rooted in a religious and philosophical system and that this is expressed in their dramatic ceremonies, intended to answer the following questions: Who am I? Why am I here? What is the purpose of life?

Freemasons come from a variety of backgrounds: royalty, presidents, writers, composers, educators, doctors, tradesmen and other cultural, social and civic leaders. There are many famous people who were Freemasons: Oscar Wilde (playwright), Neil Armstrong (astronaut), Louis Armstrong (jazz musician) to name but a few. Freemasonry has a presence all over the world, with a sovereign body in each country called a Grand Lodge; in the United States there is one Grand Lodge for each state. Most of the membership (an estimated six million) is in the USA and Canada.

Do you wish to research the masonic past of an individual in your family? Do you suspect that your ancestor may have been a Freemason? Freemasons

often kept details about their involvement with the fraternity private from their families and non-Freemason friends. If your relative was a Freemason, chances are that there will be a record of their masonic life out there, waiting to be uncovered.

Why did your ancestor join the Freemasons? Some of the reasons could be: for brotherhood and friendship, to contribute to charitable causes (fundraising events, scholarships/grants, training and apprenticeships); character building and self-confidence to be a better person; for entertainment (ceremonies, parties, balls and other events); the very impressive regalia (aprons, jewels and other accessories); to be part of the moral fabric of society or to meet in unity and peace with people from all walks of life, irrespective of race, class and social background.

First things first, oral history. When the opportunity arises, interview relatives to get some initial information and see if there is any to find. This must be done with sensitivity and respect. Simple and well thought out questioning is needed, one question at a time. Then, you will need to search for the name of your relative in the relevant membership registers and other available records. Freemasons kept their involvement with the fraternity a secret, but it was not uncommon for them to encourage other menfolk to join the brotherhood. It is also well worth reading up as much as you can on Freemasonry to inform your search; there is a lot to read in libraries, archives and online. 
Grand Lodges often kept records of their membership, however, searching for masonic records can be challenging, but with persistence and focus you can reveal unknown and useful information about an ancestor. So, what next? Do you really need to know any more?

Here are some useful tips:

ask your local Grand Lodge whether your relative was a member. Keep in mind that lodges get a lot of requests for help in genealogical searches, so patience is needed.



- remember to provide as much information about your relative as you can: full name; birth and death dates; profession, where he/she lived and religion. Review your notes often and think creatively.
- search for lists and registration records of Grand Lodges on the internet – Ancestry.com houses membership registers for England and Wales and Ireland. https://www.ancestry.co.uk/search/categories/freemason registers/ [below]







- do not overlook social media—the Grand Lodge you are interested in may have a Facebook page. Run a search and message the page's administrator and members asking for information. It is always worth a try.

We can learn a lot about our Freemason ancestors from the beautiful regalia and jewels they wore—rings, lapel pins, tie tacks and other items. This confirmed their involvement, status, order and the degree: 1° Entered Apprentice, 2° Fellowcraft or 3° Master Mason.

Very few Grand Lodges accepted women, however, female family members may recall being asked to join the Order of the Eastern Star, a women's group affiliated to the Masons. The Order of the Eastern Star is about charity, service and fellowship and was initiated by Dr Bob Morris and his wife Charlotte in the mid-nineteenth century. There is also the Order of Women Freemasons which was founded in 1908. The Order of Women Freemasons initially had both men and women as members, but by 1935 it became an exclusively female organisation.

For some people, the discovery of a Freemason ancestor may bring about feelings of suspicion, shock, embarrassment or shame. For others it is just a matter of fact. What do you do next? Do you really need to know more? You may be hesitant on whether to tell the family or wondering how to present this information on the family tree. You can find some useful chapters on ethical dilemmas in the following books by Dr. Penny Walters: Ethical Dilemmas in Genealogy and The Psychology of Searching, both available in paperback and on Kindle from Amazon.

More and more information is being made available for family historians to explore and learn about their ancestors and their past lives. We are increasingly finding ourselves armed with specific information about our ancestors. This encourages us to look more closely and differently at our family histories and at the world we live in. Understanding who we are and where we come from helps in providing a great sense of self, identity and belonging. For most of us, the ideal is that we should appreciate and celebrate who we are, and where we come from.

We also host small group meetings which meet online to chat about a group of Devon parishes. These now cover the whole county and its 500+ parishes and have proved mutually beneficial to people who have research interests in the locality as well as local inhabitants. In undertaking this project we will share images, stories and information of long ago in west Lancashire, keeping alive the history and heritage of the area.

We, as a society, will benefit from new skills learned, increased publicity and improved profile and be doing something we are passionate about.

The publications will help people identify more with their community and gain a sense of the of the importance of the area in previous centuries.

A more civic minded population who will take pride in where they live and want to be more involved, resulting in economic benefits and profile.

Our heritage is important and must be preserved.

We estimate that we will need £3084 to enable us to produce two small books, which will be available to our members and the public at no cost.
